- Parents and trusted adults are having open and honest conversations with their children about love, sex and relationships.




NFPRHA Grant Goal



A regulatory or policy change resulting in routine updates to the Medicaid reimbursement rates for contraceptives

SC Objectives



Increase the number of women on Medicaid who have access to and choose Long Acting Reversible Contraceptives (LARCs)

Increase Medicaid reimbursement rates for LARC insertion for private providers





SC Activities



- ✓ Collect information on current family planning services paid for by Medicaid by age and delivery site (Title X clinic, FQHC, Private Physicians)
- ✓ Conduct interviews with private physicians to assess knowledge, attitudes and beliefs towards use of LARCs with their Medicaid clients
- ✓ Establish a medical advisory group to review information and make recommendations on policy changes
- ✓ Educate physicians about policy changes and implement marketing strategy for physicians and women about the benefits and availability of LARCs

SC HHS BOI Focus Areas



Patient Safety and Quality Care

- Reduce rates of delivery <39 weeks gestational age
- Decrease number of VLBW infants <100g.
 born outside of Level III hospitals

Comprehensive Behavioral Health

- Increase screening, brief intervention and referrals to treatment services
- Focus on infants exposed prenatally to narcotics

BOI Focus Areas



Care Coordination

- Improve access to LARCs
- Ensure access t 17-P treatment for prevention of preterm birth
- Supporting COIN objective
 - Improve inter-conception and pre-conception access to healthcare for women
 - Improve follow-up care at the post-partum visit

LARC Success



Prior to March 1, 2012, LARCs were not reimbursed outside of the DRG when inserted inpatient

Providers relied on mother coming to the outpatient clinic/office after discharge for contraceptive

LARC Success



- New policy provides separate reimbursement for hospitals and physicians to insert LARCs postpartum prior to discharge
- Policy likely to reduce the number of repeat and unintended births
- Opportunity to assist providers with a policy driven to improve health outcomes for their patients by removing barriers to appropriate care
- Policy makes sense for providers and hospitals financially


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Immediate Postpartum Insertion of Long-Acting Reversible Contraception

Nearly 1 in 5 teen births are repeat births, about 183 a day.

Many repeat births could be prevented through postpartum use of longacting reversible contraception (LARC) such as IUDs and implants. Counseling women during prenatal visits about postpartum contraception, and offering women LARC in the hospital after delivery makes it easier for

South Carolina's Medicaid* 📆 [PDF - 27KB] 🗗 program reimburses for LARC insertion in the hospital before women who have just given birth leave the hospital.


