
## **IOWA**



Title X-funded health centers helped women avoid one million unintended pregnancies in 2013, which prevented 501,000 unplanned births and 345,000 abortions.


Despite these positive health impacts, federal funding for Title X has shrunk, and now fewer low-income and uninsured people across the country, and in lowa, are able to access family planning and sexual health services funded by Title X.

**Health Center Closures** 







Both grantees have experienced multiple site closures, staff layoffs, and shortened service hours, which have reulted in fewer appointment times available and eventually fewer patients being served.

The grantees have also reported difficulty purchasing a full range of contraception, as funding has not kept pace with the increased cost of supplies.
