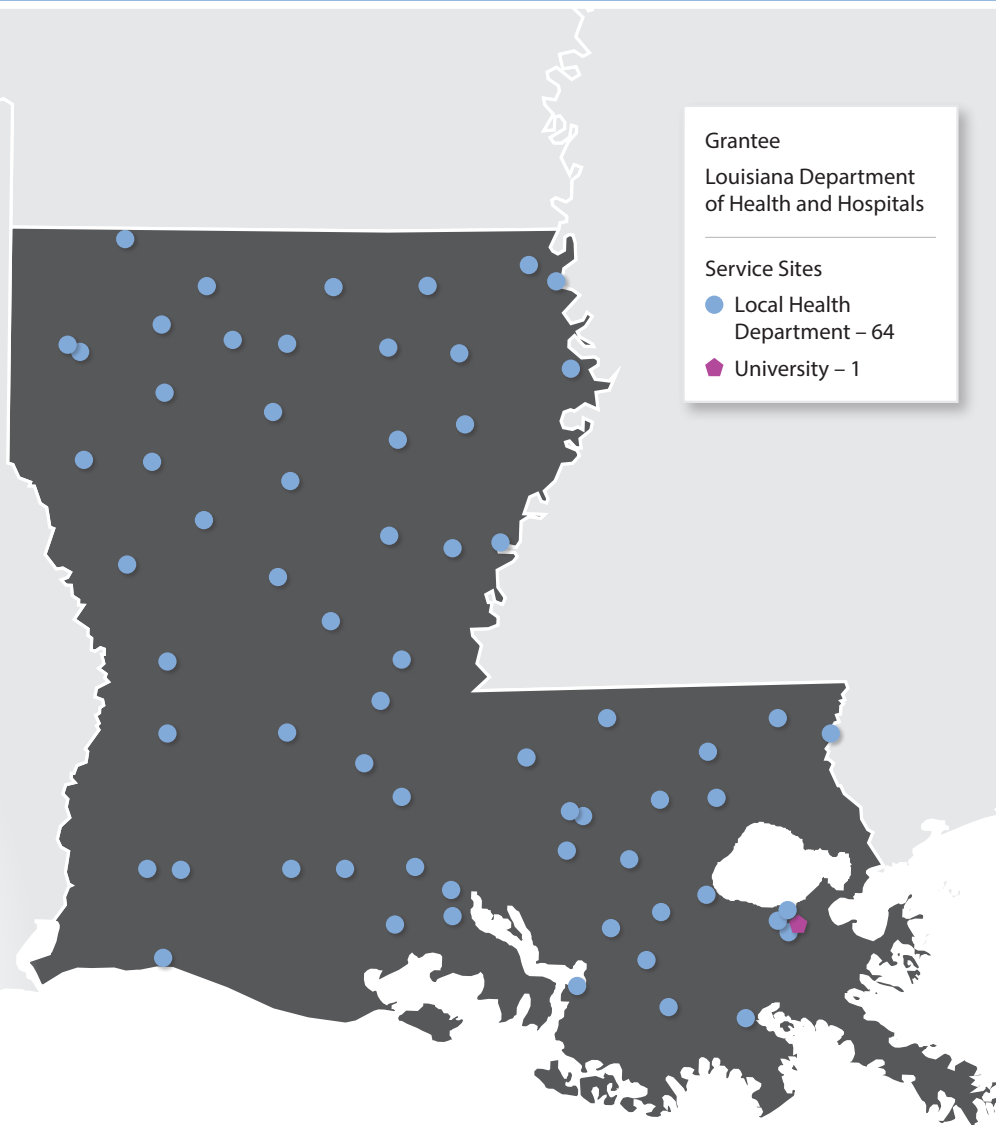


# The Impact of Title X Funding Cuts in LOUISIANA

Title X-funded health centers helped women avoid one million unintended pregnancies in 2013, which prevented 501,000 unplanned births and 345,000 abortions.

Despite these positive health impacts, federal funding for Title X has shrunk, and now fewer low-income and uninsured people across the country, and in Louisiana, are able to access family planning and sexual health services funded by Title X.

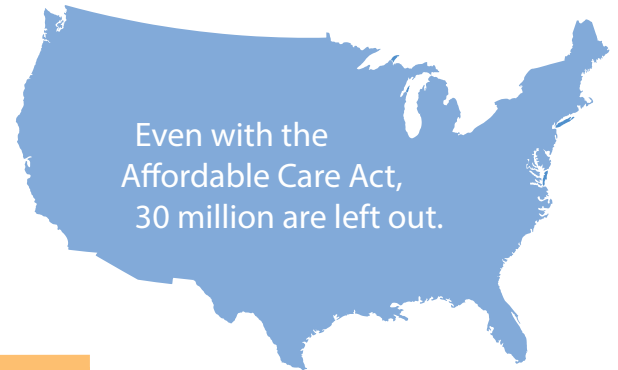

State budget cuts in 2010 and 2011 led directly to clinic closures in the state.

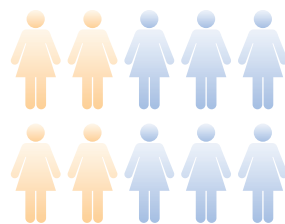
