The Impact of Title X Funding Cuts in NEW YORK

Title X-funded health centers helped women avoid one million unintended pregnancies in 2013, which prevented 501,000 unplanned births and 345,000 abortions.

Despite these positive health impacts, federal funding for Title X has shrunk, and now fewer low-income and uninsured people across the country, and in New York, are able to access family planning and sexual health services funded by Title X. Cuts have resulted in reductions in education and outreach, delays in rehiring open positions (including clinical providers), slightly reduced clinic hours, and (for some sites) delays in adoption of on-site LARC provision. Grantees have had difficulty attracting FQHCs to begin to offer Title X-funded services
