


Title X-funded health centers helped women avoid one million unintended pregnancies in 2013, which prevented 501,000 unplanned births and 345,000 abortions.

Despite these positive health impacts, federal funding for Title X has shrunk, and now fewer low-income and uninsured people across the country, and in Washington, are able to access family planning and sexual health services funded by Title X.

CONSEQUENCES OF FUNDING LOSSES







One rural agency has closed due to financial hardship. We are in the process of trying to create a partnership between an existing FP contractor and the local community health center to resume services in that area. Another health department has had to close two family planning clinic sites. A Planned Parenthood is trying to serve those clients. All agencies have had to reduce hours and layoff staff. Almost all are running with minimal staff.
