

Title X-funded health centers helped women avoid one million unintended pregnancies in 2013, which prevented 501,000 unplanned births and 345,000 abortions.

Despite these positive health impacts, federal funding for Title X has shrunk, and now fewer low-income and uninsured people across the country, and in West Virginia, are able to access family planning and sexual health services funded by Title X.

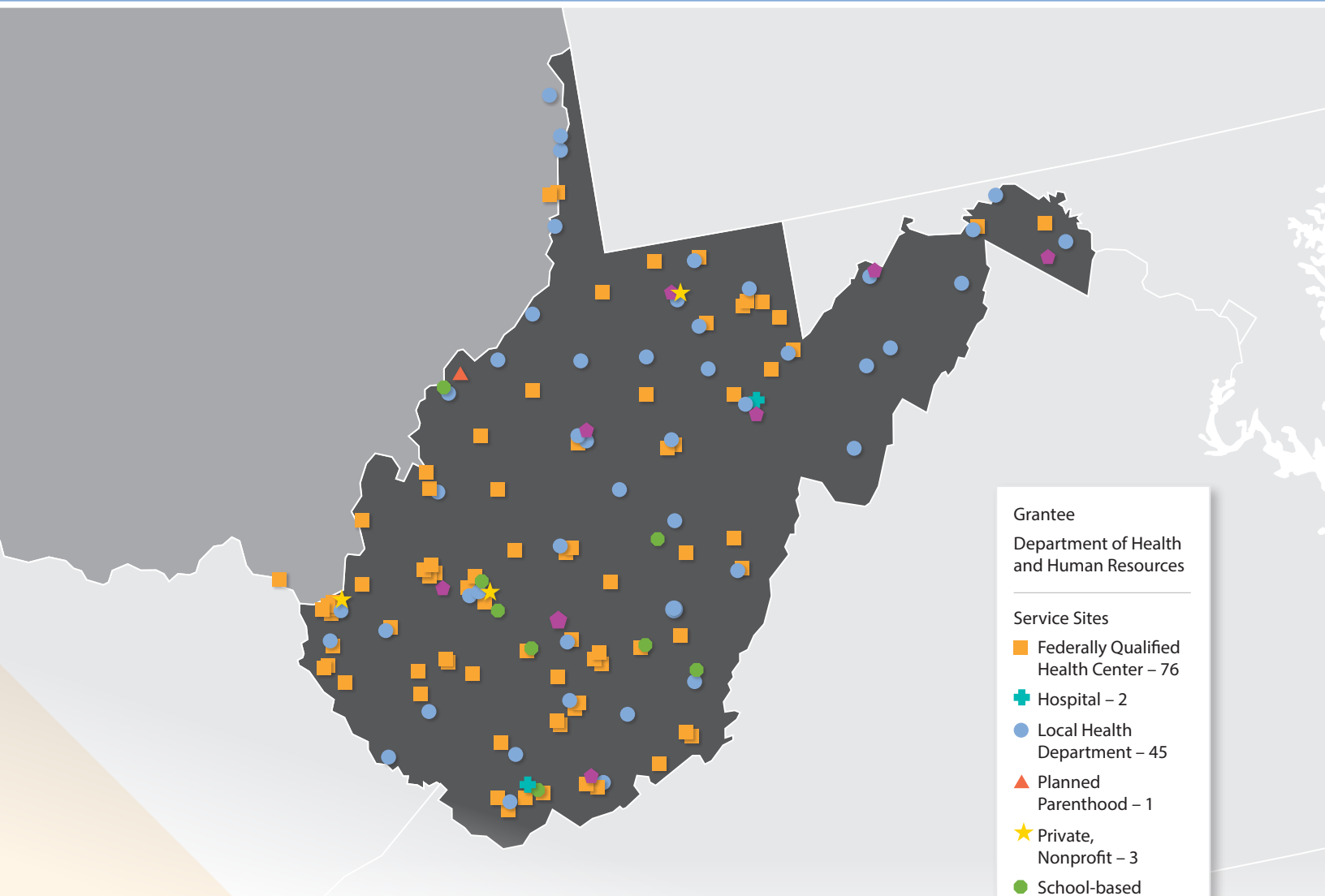

As a result, West Virginia is receiving less money to provide patients the quality care they count on all across the state.

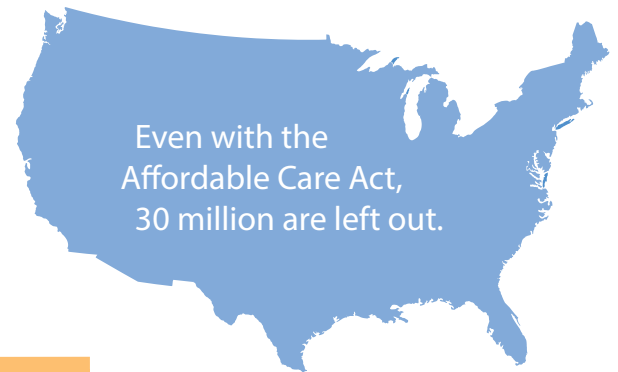

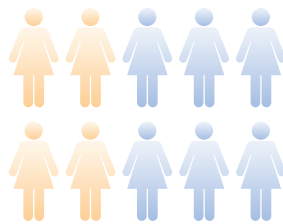
