

## 2019 Family Planning Annual Report

### Social Media Guidance

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In September, the Office of Population Affairs (OPA), the agency within the US Department of Health and Human Services that administers the Title X family planning program, released its 2019 Family Planning Annual Report (FPAR), which provides a national, regional and state-by-state snapshot of the Title X family planning network and the people who rely on it for care. Unfortunately, the dangerous and unlawful restrictions in the Trump administration's 2019 program rule have battered the program, as longstanding providers have been forced to withdraw from Title X and others are navigating a misguided framework to maintain high-quality services. The federal report is a prime opportunity to not only speak out against the Title X rule but bring attention to the core mission of a public health program that Congress enacted 50 years ago.

##### *Patient Loss*

State-specific data is below

- The Title X program has seen a staggering loss in patients in the past year, according to federal data recently released. Nationally, the program served 800,000 fewer people in 2019 – a 21% decrease from the year before. #SaveTitleX
- The unlawful Title X rule and years of budget cuts have led to a dramatic loss in patients being able to seek family planning care from a Title X-funded provider. In [name of state] alone, XX patients disappeared from the program between 2018-2019. #SaveTitleX
- 2.1 million fewer patients were seen annually in 2019 compared to in 2010. That's amounts to a 41% decrease in individuals accessing Title-X funded care. #SaveTitleX
- 800,000. That's the estimated number of patients who lost access to a Title X-funded provider in 2019, according to federal data. A troubling decline fueled primarily funding cuts and this administration's unlawful Title X program restrictions. #SaveTitleX
- Allowing #TitleX regs to be enforced has devastated the program in communities across the country. According to federal data, family planning providers in [name of state] served X fewer people in 2019 than just one year earlier. #SaveTitleX
- HHS' harmful family planning rule is unlawful & doing irreparable harm to our nation's low-income and underserved patients. Patients deserve high-quality, comprehensive care. We will not stand for any less. #SaveTitleX
- Funding cuts to and harmful restrictions placed on Title X are having a devastating impact on the public's health. Since 2010, 2.1 million people have lost access to the program resulting in a 44% decrease in Pap smears, a 45% decrease in breast exams. In the last year alone, the Title X program conducted 10% fewer HIV tests to male patients. #SaveTitleX

*Program snapshot*

- Title X is a critical source of health care for all people – especially women of color, people with low incomes, and the uninsured. @NFPRHA has released a new snapshot of a program with a 50-year track record of success. #SaveTitleX
- The Title X program serves as a critical lifeline for people who are marginalized and otherwise lack access to the health care they need. 64% of Title X patients live at or below federal poverty and receive care at no cost. #SaveTitleX
- Title X was created to ensure access to high-quality family planning and sexual health care for all, regardless of income. 88% of Title X patients live at or below 250% of federal poverty and receive either free or discounted care. #SaveTitleX
- Federal data show a growing number of insured people are seeking care in Title X settings. In 2019, 20% of patients had private insurance, compared to 8% in 2009. #SaveTitleX
- The Family Planning Annual Report shows that the Affordable Care Act is working in public settings and that a growing number of insured people are seeking care in a Title X setting. #SaveTitleX
- At a time when unemployment and insurance loss is on the rise, federal data reinforces that it's time to restore Title X's quality framework and provide the program the essential resources needed to meet the demand of communities nationwide. #SaveTitleX
