

Title X-funded health centers helped women avoid one million unintended pregnancies in 2013, which prevented 501,000 unplanned births and 345,000 abortions.

Despite these positive health impacts, federal funding for Title X has shrunk, and now fewer low-income and uninsured people across the country, and in Florida, are able to access family planning and sexual health services funded by Title X.

WHY TITLE X MATTERS

Funding limitations have resulted in 13 health center closures, loss of staff and/or positions, limited clinical service hours due to decreased available staff, and a decline the total number of clients.

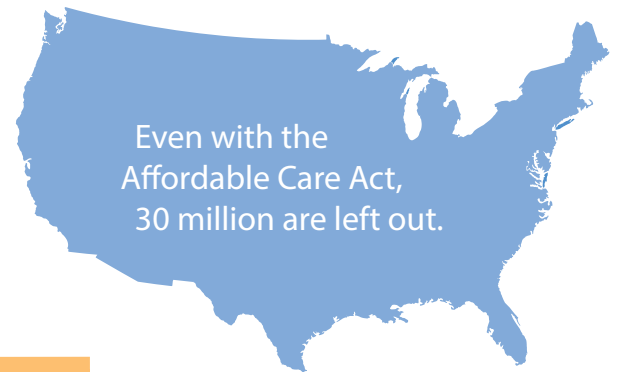
Since 2011, the percentage of clients has decreased each year.

The Florida Department of Health is currently the only Title X grantee in Florida, though two other organizations also received Title X funding until 2014.



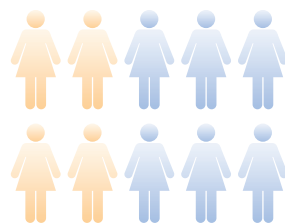
