

Data Notes

- NFPRHA staff put each Title X-funded health center in one of five categories: family planning health center, federally qualified health center, health department, Planned Parenthood, or hospital. Please note the following:
 - Family planning health centers include sites that do not fit any of the other four categories as well as freestanding family planning providers.
 - Federally qualified health centers include FQHC look-alikes.
 - School- and university-based sites were placed in the category for the entity that oversees their family planning and sexual health services. For example, if a hospital operates a site at a high school, that site is categorized as a hospital.
 - NFPRHA used slightly different categorizations for its 2017 state factsheets. The 2020 documents should not be compared to the 2017 documents to identify exact changes over time.
- Map data reflect the best available data from grantees and the Office of Population Affairs for 2019. Current service delivery networks may be different than the maps listed on these documents.
- Current grantees include grantees that remained in the program after the implementation of the 2019 Title X rule. The given grant amount is each grantee's award from April 2019 and does not include any supplemental funds distributed by HHS after that date.
- On the state factsheet, Medicaid eligibility refers to a percentage of the federal poverty line (detailed on the back page of the document). The given percentage may refer to either a full-benefit Medicaid program or a family-planning only program funded through a Medicaid waiver or state plan amendment (SPA). NFPRHA has reported the highest income level that provides for coverage in any of these programs for a given state.
