

# Title X in Hawaii Improving Public Health and Saving Taxpayer Dollars

Between FY2005 – FY2015, funding for Title X was cut by \$150 million — 10% in ten fiscal years.

#### Title X Served 15,746 Hawaii Residents in 2015

The State of Hawaii Department of Health Reproductive Health Services Unit is the sole Title X grantee in Hawaii, i supporting 35 Title X-funded health centers across the state including federally qualified health centers, Planned Parenthoods, and university-based health centers. The Title X network served 15,206 women and 540 men, for a total of 15,746 residents of Hawaii in 2015.

Title X provides high-quality family planning services and other preventive health care to low-income and uninsured individuals who may otherwise lack access to health care.

- > Of the 15,746 patients served, **81%** had incomes at or below 100% of the federal poverty level (FPL), iv *meaning they earned* **\$13,550** a year or less.
- Ninety-five percent of Title X patients in Hawaii earned less than \$33,875. vi a year (250% of the FPL). vii

### Title X Saves Hawaii's Taxpayer Dollars

Title X supports critical infrastructure needs that are not reimbursable under Medicaid and commercial insurance, such as staff salaries, individual patient education, community-level outreach, and public education about family planning, women's health, and sexual health issues. Without Title X, access to high-quality family planning services for low-income Hawaiians would not be possible.

- The average cost of a Medicaid-funded birth is \$18,080.viii In 2010, births resulting from unintended pregnancies cost Hawaii's taxpayers \$114.5 million.ix
- The Title X program helps alleviate the costs of unintended pregnancy through contraception, counseling, and other services.

#### Title X is Essential to Improving Public Health and Saving Taxpayer Dollars in Hawaii

Cutting funding for family planning services will lead to more unintended pregnancies and higher health care costs in Hawaii. Family planning helps women and families plan the timing and spacing of their pregnancies, which results in better educational attainment and economic security; these, in turn, are linked to better health outcomes for women, men, and families.

- Family planning services at Hawaii's Title Xfunded health centers helped prevent 4,400 unintended pregnancies in 2014, which would likely have resulted in 2,100 unintended births and 1,600 abortions.xi
- Without publicly funded family planning, the number of unintended pregnancies in Hawaii would be 28% higher.xii
- Title X-funded services produce significant cost savings to the federal and state governments; services provided at Title Xsupported sites in Hawaii associated for not

## Hawaii's Title X-funded health centers provide a wide range of services:

- Pregnancy testing
- Contraceptive services
- Pelvic exams
- Screening for cervical and breast cancer
- Screening for high blood pressure, anemia, and diabetes
- Screening for STDs and HIV/AIDS
- Infertility services
- Health education
- Referrals for other health and social services

supported sites in Hawaii accounted for nearly \$48.4 million in such savings in 2010 alone.xiii

Additional cuts to Title X funding—especially in the current economy—would harm tens of thousands of low-income and poor families throughout Hawaii, in turn costing, not saving, the federal government money.
