

## Title X in Minnesota Improving Public Health and Saving Taxpayer Dollars

**Between FY2005 – FY2015, funding for Title X was cut by \$150 million – 10% in ten fiscal years.**

### Title X Served 59,673 Minnesota Residents in 2015

Planned Parenthood of Minnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota, and St. Paul–Ramsey County Public Health are the Title X grantees in Minnesota, <sup>i</sup> supporting 41 Title X–funded health centers across the state including hospitals, Planned Parenthoods, and other private non–profits.<sup>ii</sup> The Title X network served 51,663 women and 8,010 men, for a total of 59,673 residents of Minnesota in 2015.<sup>iii</sup>

*Title X provides high-quality family planning services and other preventive health care to low-income and uninsured individuals who may otherwise lack access to health care.*

- Of the 59,673 patients served, **48%** had incomes at or below 100% of the federal poverty level (FPL), <sup>iv</sup> **meaning they earned \$11,770 a year or less.** <sup>v</sup>
- **Eighty-seven percent** of Title X patients in Minnesota **earned less than \$29,425.**<sup>vi</sup> a year (250% of the FPL).<sup>vii</sup>

### Title X Saves Minnesota's Taxpayer Dollars

Title X supports critical infrastructure needs that are not reimbursable under Medicaid and commercial insurance, such as staff salaries, individual patient education, community–level outreach, and public education about family planning, women's health, and sexual health issues. Without Title X, access to high-quality family planning services for low-income Minnesotans would not be possible.

- The average cost of a Medicaid–funded birth is \$10,594.<sup>viii</sup> In 2010, births resulting from unintended pregnancies cost Minnesota's taxpayers \$332.6 million.<sup>ix</sup>
- The Title X program helps alleviate the costs of unintended pregnancy through contraception, counseling, and other services.<sup>x</sup>

## Title X is Essential to Improving Public Health and Saving Taxpayer Dollars in Minnesota

Cutting funding for family planning services will lead to more unintended pregnancies and higher health care costs in Minnesota. Family planning helps women and families plan the timing and spacing of their pregnancies, which results in better educational attainment and economic security; these, in turn, are linked to better health outcomes for women, men, and families.

➤ Family planning services at Minnesota's Title X-funded health centers helped prevent 11,900 unintended pregnancies in 2014, which would likely have resulted in 5,800 unintended births and 4,300 abortions.<sup>xi</sup>

➤ Without publicly funded family planning, the number of unintended pregnancies in Minnesota would be 31% higher.<sup>xii</sup>

➤ Title X-funded services produce significant cost savings to the federal and state governments; services provided at Title X-supported sites in Minnesota accounted for nearly \$93.5 million in such savings in 2010 alone.<sup>xiii</sup>

### *Minnesota's Title X-funded health centers provide a wide range of services:*

- Pregnancy testing
- Contraceptive services
- Pelvic exams
- Screening for cervical and breast cancer
- Screening for high blood pressure, anemia, and diabetes
- Screening for STDs and HIV/AIDS
- Infertility services
- Health education
- Referrals for other health and social services

**Additional cuts to Title X funding—especially in the current economy—would harm tens of thousands of low-income and poor families throughout Minnesota, in turn costing, not saving, the federal government money.**
